Medical Assistance (Medicaid) Impacts within District

- At least **1 in 3 children** rely on Medical Assistance for health care in **Cameron, Clearfield, Clinton, Crawford, Elk, Jefferson, Lycoming, McKean, Mifflin, Potter, Tioga, Venango, and Warren Counties**.
- For the counties in this district, there are a **total of 155,111 individuals** who rely on **Medicaid** for health care.
- In Pennsylvania, **every dollar spent in Pennsylvania's Medicaid program generates \$2.77 in economic activity in local communities** through the purchase of needed goods and services (Source: Families USA). As a result, **Pennsylvania's Medicaid program had an economic impact of \$2.5 billion within the counties in this Congressional district**, with each county's impact listed below.
 - Cameron – \$11 million
 - Centre – \$227 million
 - Clarion – \$131 million
 - Clearfield – \$281 million
 - Clinton – \$79 million
 - Crawford – \$283 million
 - Elk – \$101 million
 - Forest – \$17 million
 - Jefferson – \$123 million
 - Juniata – \$40 million
 - Lycoming – \$319 million
 - McKean – \$152 million
 - Mifflin – \$141 million
 - Potter – \$45 million
 - Tioga – \$85 million
 - Venango – \$341 million
 - Warren – \$109 million
- **Pennsylvania's budget for Medical Assistance for 2010-11, which includes the FMAP extension, will support an estimated 218,000 jobs statewide** (Source: Families USA) in the health care sector (nursing homes, hospitals, home health care agencies, etc.).
- Every million dollars cut from health investments in Pennsylvania's Medicaid budget will result in a loss of \$2.7 million in economic activity in Pennsylvania.
